SYRIA'S table tennis prodigy Hend Zaza, who competed at the Tokyo Olympic Games aged 12 and is now 15, won the WTT Youth Contender under-15 title in Doha and also finished runner-up in the under-17 event, reports the Syrian Arab News Agency.







"As sports are also closely linked to climate change, the KSOC will do its best to host sports events in an environmentally friendly manner and expand the use of green products to achieve our environmental benchmark goals," he said.

HARBIN WELCOMES OCA FOR AWG COORDINATION MEETINGS

he Olympic Council of Asia's Coordination Committee for the 9th Asian Winter Games paid their first visit to Harbin from January 11-13.

With the 9th AWG set to be held from February 7-14, 2025 in the capital city of Heilongjiang province in north-east China, the OCA CC members were able to meet with sports and government leaders, visit venues and immerse themselves in the snow and ice culture of Harbin.

This will be the second time for Harbin to organise the AWG, following their hosting of the third edition in 1996, and the Chair of the OCA Coordination Committee, Timothy Fok, had no doubts about the capability of the Chinese to stage another winter extravaganza.

"Harbin is well-known and world-famous for the annual ice and snow festival. It is also recognised as the hotbed of winter sports in China," he said.

"In the build-up to the Olympic Winter Games Beijing 2022, China introduced more than 300 million people to the joys of winter sports. The OCA congratulates China on this staggering achievement, and we are sure the Asian Winter Games Harbin 2025 will benefit from this explosion of interest in winter sports."

The OCA Director General, Husain Al Musallam, said the new Harbin was unrecognisable from the Harbin of 1996 as it had become a "modern and dynamic" city and tourism capital.





"I congratulate you on what you have done since 1996. We are very happy and proud with the impact the Asian Winter Games in 1996 made on Harbin, and how it has changed Harbin."

Regarding the 9th AWG in February 2025, Capt. Husain added: "Time is not in our favour. We have one year to go and we have a lot of things to do but, with good cooperation and understanding, I am sure the organising committee, the city, the province and the Chinese Olympic Committee will organise one of the best Asian Winter Games in the history of Asia and show the world that we, in Asia, are committed to the development of winter sports."



HAWGOC UNVEILS MASCOTS,

he Harbin Asian Winter Games Organising Committee (HAWGOC) put on a colourful and high-energy show to launch the mascots, emblem and slogan for the 9th Asian Winter Games Harbin 2025.

The event took place at the Shangri-La Hotel on Thursday, January 11 and brought a fun, festive and family feel to the occasion.

The cultural programme began with the opening dance, "Welcome to Harbin", before the Mayor of Harbin, Zhang Qixiang, outlined the public contribution to the process, with 4,608 entries received since the global solicitation period began on September 19, 2023.

"We believe that the slogan, emblem and mascots will become historical imprints to be passed down, shining brightly in the Olympic Movement," said Mayor Zhang.

Chen Lei, a professor from the Academy of Arts and Design at Tsinghua University, then spoke of the creative process and design concepts behind the emblem and mascots.

After the VIP guests had taken part in the launch ceremony on stage, and a promotional video was shown to highlight the role and value of the mascots, slogan and emblem, the event concluded with a charming song and dance performance entitled "I'm waiting for you in Heilongjiang".

EMBLEM

The emblem of the 9th Asian Winter Games is entitled "Breakthrough". It cleverly integrates the graceful posture of a short track speed skater together with the colour lilac – the city flower of Harbin – and dancing ribbons.

The emblem depicts China's growth as a winter sports power and, like a tough and determined short track speed skater, the ambition to challenge all the way to the finish line.

The OCA's shining sun emblem beams down on the athlete, while the dancing ribbons add a festive visual sensation.

"It shows China's pursuit of becoming a sporting powerhouse in the new era and its willingness to contribute to the ice and snow sports in Asia," Prof. Chen noted.







EMBLEM, SLOGAN FOR HARBIN 2025

MASCOTS

The mascots of the 9th Asian Winter Games in 2025 are a pair of cute Northeast tigers: Binbin and Nini.

Binbin represents ice sports, skating happily and with a red scarf to keep out the cold. Nini, on the other hand, represents snow sports as she flies through the air on her snowboard.

The name Binbin is taken from the last syllable of host city Harbin, and Nini comes from the pronunciation of the Chinese character Nin (You). Together, they mean "Harbin Welcomes You" and showcase Harbin's fervent expectations and sincere welcome to friends from various Asian countries.

The overall image of the two mascots is that they are strong, cute and enthusiastic about winter sports on both ice and snow, and will provide a warm welcome to the Harbin AWG.

In traditional Chinese culture, the tiger, as a symbol of auspiciousness, is endowed with lots of positive qualities, among which integrity, strength and courage are highly compatible with the spirit of the Olympic Games.

Binbin and Nini are designed and created based on two cute little Northeastern tigers born in September 2023 in the Northeast Tiger Forest Park of Heilongjiang Province.



SLOGAN

The slogan for Harbin 2025 is "Dream of Winter, Love among Asia".

"Dream of Winter" aims to showcase the charm of ice and snow sports for athletes from around Asia and to build a stage for realising their dreams, while "Love among Asia" demonstrates the common aspiration of people from all countries to enhance unity and friendship and to promote mutual understanding.



GETTING TO KNOW HARBIN AND YABULI AHEAD OF AWG 2025

- The 9th Asian Winter Games Harbin 2025 will open on February 7 and close on February 14. Harbin International Conference Centre will host the opening and closing ceremony.
- The men's ice hockey, women's ice hockey and curling will all begin on February 5, two days before the opening ceremony.
- There will be a total of 64 medal events across the 11 disciplines of six sports: skating, ice hockey, curling, skiing, biathlon and ski mountaineering.

SAUDI ARABIA TAPS INTO CHINESE EXPERTISE AHEAD OF 2029 AWG

he transfer of knowledge from one organising committee to the next is a big part of the smooth transition and success of an international multi-sport games.

This is most certainly the case for the 9th – and 10th – Asian Winter Games.

The OCA Coordination Committee for the 9th AWG in Harbin includes His Highness Sheikh Fahad bin Jalawi bin Abdulaziz Al Saud, Vice President of the Saudi Olympic and Paralympic Committee – host of the 10th AWG in Trojena in 2029.

Between now and 2029, Sheikh Fahad is gathering as much information as possible, from Harbin and also from Milan-Cortina, Italian hosts of the next Winter Olympics in 2026.

"Harbin is really a nice city, amazing city, nice people, nice hospitality, and the Chinese Olympic Committee and the Chinese community, they are already having the best experience of hosting any kind of games," said Sheikh Fahad.

"A few months ago, we witnessed the success of the Hangzhou Asian Games. Regarding the winter sports, two years ago was the Winter Olympic Games which was a great success as well, with a difficult timing with the restrictions of covid, but they organised it in a very high standard.



AMAZING GAMES

"So, I really believe that the Asian Winter Games here in Harbin will be a high-standard games. The venues are really amazing, and Harbin as a city has experienced the Asian Winter Games in 1996 and the Winter Universiade in 2009, so I am sure that this will be an amazing Games. I am looking forward to being here next year."

During the OCA Coordination Committee meeting on January 11, OCA Director General Husain Al Musallam pointed out the significance of the transfer of knowledge from one city to the next host.

Sheikh Fahad said: "This is very important. I discussed this with Captain Husain and I discussed it with the Chinese side regarding the observer programme.

"But we don't want to have it as a normal observer programme; we want to get deep on the Chinese side to understand how they organise the winter sports.

"Our team already started two years ago for the preparation and I think that Saudi will be ready in 2029. But, of course, we have to work with the Chinese to get the most of the experience they have in Harbin next year, and hopefully we will have a successful Games in 2029."



CITY OF DREAMERS

When asked what to expect in Trojena in 2029, Sheikh Fahad replied: "Trojena is a city of dreamers, so you can expect whatever you are dreaming of because it is having the city of the future. They have Trojena in the mountains and we have The Line project not far from it, so it will be co-hosted hopefully with some venues in The Line.

"I think the progress of the project is going very well. As I mentioned, you have to expect anything high and everything amazing."

The Line is the city of the future, as stated by Sheikh Fahad, with plans for 9 million residents in 34 square km. It will be 500 metres tall, 200m wide and 170km long – hence the title of The Line.

SHIVA'S PASSION FOR WINTER SPORTS STILL BURNS BRIGHTLY

At the age of 42 and with six Olympic Winter Games under his belt, the passion for ice and snow still burns brightly within retired Indian luge legend Shiva Keshavan.

Shiva, who made his Olympic debut as a 16-year-old daredevil at Nagano 1998, continued his association with winter sports as a member of the OCA Coordination Committee for the 9th AWG in Harbin.

During the course of the three-day visit, Shiva shared more than just his experience and knowledge of winter sports competition; it was his pure love of winter sports that was evident throughout.

When asked what winter sports meant to him, Shiva replied: "For me, winter sports is freedom; it is socialising; it is just this renewal of the world because everything looks new in winter.

"So, I think the appeal of winter sports - there is a lot more romance, there is a lot more adventure, which is why I think I have spent my entire life in this field.

"From the youngest kid who dreams of the snowflakes falling, making snowmen, to the most experienced athlete chasing that thrill and that adventure down the slope...it

wakes up that child in you. You want to connect with people and share this experience."

Shiva, whose last Olympics as a luge athlete was PyeongChang 2018, said he was "very grateful" to be nominated by the OCA to this AWG Coordination Committee as it would help him make the transition from athlete to administrator by keeping him involved at the highest level.

He also believes that China is perfectly positioned to become a world leader in the Olympic winter sports movement.

"It is always impressive to visit China and to discover all the progress they have made in recent years, specifically for winter sports," added.

"From Asia's perspective, if we have to plan and have a new development programme, new circuit, this is a place that can really take a lot of initiatives."

"With the kind of facilities they have, they can really be a leader for developing the sport in the entire region. Winter

sports has traditionally been very central European focused; of course, we have the emergence of North America already for quite some time, and Russia has always been there, but the governance and the competition structure and everything has been centered in central Europe.

"From Asia's perspective, if we have to plan and have a new development programme, new circuit, this is a place than can really take a lot of initiatives. From an organisation point of view, the efficiency of the organisation is fantastic; that's how they have been successfully able to host multiple sports events so frequently and doing a good job with it."

Looking ahead to the AWG Harbin 2025, Shiva thinks the athletes can expect "a fantastic level" of competition, organisation and venues.

"The facilities are really great; as for the organisation, there is nothing to say about the efficiency of how the logistics are organised here.

"I think that we can expect, from the official motto 'simple, safe and spectacular', so no frills but it is going to be top-class so the athletes can compete at top-of-the-world level infrastructure over here."



"I am sure the meeting will be most fruitful and productive and put us firmly on the right path towards the 20th Asian Games."



"I would like to express my deepest condolences and sympathy to all those affected and wish for a quick recovery on behalf of all attendees here today."

OCA CC MEMBERS ENJOY FIRST VENUE TOUR IN NAGOYA

embers of the OCA Coordination Committee were taken on their first venue tour as part of the first OCA Coordination Committee meeting for the 20th Asian Games 2026 in Nagoya on Monday, January 8.

The OCA CC members were shown various venues, both competition and non-competition, during a two-bus journey accompanied by representatives of organising committee AINAGOC.

The tour began at the Prince Hotel Nagoya Sky Tower, which has been proposed as the NOC HQ Hotel, and continued with the Nagoya Convention Hall, which occupies three floors of the hotel.

With 170 rooms, the Prince Hotel, which opened in 2017, is being considered as the accommodation for the Chefs de Mission and team officials, incorporating all the associated services.

The tour then went past Nagoya City Mizuho Park Athletic Stadium, which is under construction and will be the main venue for the 20th Asian Games featuring the opening and closing ceremony and the athletics competition.

The new venue will have a capacity of 30,000, with 5,000 temporary seats available for the ceremonies.

The final port of call was the Toyoda Gosei Memorial Gymnasium, known as Entrio. The venue has a capacity of 3,000 seats and will be one of the two venues for the handball competition at the 20th Asian Games.

OCA CC members were able to check the court, the spectator seating and the facilities for athletes.

Some of the sports will be held outside Aichi prefecture, including swimming and diving at the Tokyo Aquatics Centre, equestrian at the JRA Equestrian Park in Tokyo and cycling – track at Izu Velodrome in Shizuoka.

Looking ahead to the next Asian Games, Governor Ohmura added: "Aichi-Nagoya has a number of sports and accommodation opportunities thanks to our past investments

and, at the 2026 Asian Games, we hope to demonstrate a new model that will make the most of such existing resources."

The prefectural governor said he looked forward to receiving advice and comments from the OCA "so that, together, we can overcome various challenges we face" and work towards a successful Asian Games in 2026.



OCA SEES BENEFITS OF WIDESPREAD ASIAN GAMES

he first OCA Coordination Committee meeting for the 2026 Asian Games wrapped up with a press conference for the local and national media on January 9.

The OCA was represented by Director General Husain Al-Musallam, Deputy Director General Vinod Kumar Tiwari and Coordination Committee Vice Chair Tayyab Ikram, while Secretary General Satoshi Murate spoke on behalf of AINAGOC.

The main topic of discussion was that the 20th Asian Games would be held throughout the prefecture of Aichi and not just in the city of Nagoya, and even further afield in Tokyo and Shizuoka Prefecture.

Vice Chair Tayyab said this presented a wonderful opportunity to spread the message of the Asian Games far and wide and engage citizens throughout the prefecture as different cities and prefectures would come under one Asian Games umbrella.



"We look at this in a very positive way because it gives the OCA and the organising committee the opportunity to promote the message of the Asian Games to a much wider audience, and not only in one city," Tayyab said.

Summing up the two-day meeting, Tayyab added: "We are going in the right direction. We had very positive discussions. This meeting was about trying to understand each other's challenges."

GANGWON 2024 YOUTH OLYMPIC GAMES

OCA celebrates success of first Winter YOG in Asia with 16-page special coverage



IOC PRESIDENT THOMAS BACH HAILS GANGWON 20

OC President Thomas Bach described Asia's first Winter Youth Olympic Games, Gangwon 2024, as a "brilliant success" during a press conference on the closing day of the YOG in Korea.

President Bach, who was accompanied by the Chair of the IOC Coordination Commission for Gangwon 2024, Zhang Hong of China, said the Winter YOG had demonstrated the legacy of the PyeongChang 2018 Olympic Winter Games in terms of hardware and software.

"You see a very happy IOC President and a very happy Chair of the Coordination Commission, Zhang Hong, because this Winter Youth Olympic Games has been a brilliant success, so I would like to congratulate everybody who has contributed to this outstanding success," he said.

The IOC President added that the athletes had been able to compete in the same state-of-the art facilities as their winter sports idols of PyeongChang 2018, while Gangwon 2024 had been able to call on many volunteers from the Winter Olympics six years ago in order to ensure the smooth running of the YOG.

Organisers stressed they had used all existing facilities in the four competition hubs and not built any new stadiums to host the Winter YOG. The IOC President also praised the legacy programmes of PyeongChang 2018, as 39 athletes from these programmes had competed at Gangwon 2024 and two athletes from countries not associated with winter sports, Thailand and Tunisia, had both won silver medals in monobob bobsleigh.

"Everybody felt at home and welcomed by the volunteers," said President Bach.


On the financial side, the IOC had assisted Gangwon 2024 to the tune of 37 million USD -25 million USD towards the cost of organising the YOG, 10 million USD for free travel and accommodation for 78 National Olympic Committees and 2 million USD for athlete preparations and qualification.

Regarding the profile of the Winter YOG through TV and social media, President Bach said 30 per cent of Korean people had seen some coverage, 75 per cent of Korean people were aware of Gangwon 2024 and 80 per cent of them had a positive view.

"The digital world went way beyond our expectations. There were 250 million engagements, which is an overwhelming success and unprecedented for a junior sports event," he said.

The IOC President added that the Winter YOG had provided the Olympic experience to the young athletes and prepared them for the Olympic Winter Olympics so that they would not be

"overwhelmed" by the occasion.

Summing up PyeongChang 2018 and Gangwon 2024, the IOC President concluded: "Korea has established itself as a premier Olympic organiser. Korea as a host is always very well appreciated, and now it is in the hands of our Korean friends," he added, referring to the possibility of a Korean bid for a future Olympic Games.

KOREA EXCELS AS WINTER YOG HOST WITH SEVEN GOLD MEDALS

ive Asian countries won medals at the 4th Winter YOG, with pride of place going to host nation Korea.

The Koreans finished third in the overall medal rankings with seven gold, six silver and four bronze medals for a total of 17. They finished behind only Italy (11-3-4-18) and Germany (9-5-6-20).

Korea's seven gold medals came in figure skating (2), snowboard (2), bobsleigh, freestyle skiing and short track speed skating.

Kim Hyungyeom won two gold medals in figure skating, men's single and team, while Beijing Winter Olympian Lee Chaeun recorded a golden double in men's snowboard - slopestyle and halfpipe.

China came in fifth with six gold, nine silver and three bronze medals for 18 in total. Their brilliant form in short track speed skating brought them four gold medals, and they also finished top of the podium in freestyle skiing and speed skating.

Japan joined Korea and China in the top 10 with a record of 3-4-8-15, with their gold medals coming in snowboard (2) and figure skating.

Kazakhstan produced a new sporting hero when ski jumper Ilya Mizernykh soared to gold on the men's normal hill, and Thailand surprised the winter sports powers with silver in the women's monobob for Agnese Campeol.

THAI TEEN MAKES WINTER SPORTS HISTORY WITH BOBSLEIGH SILVER

ropical Thailand has a new sporting hero – and it's in winter sports!

At the Alpensia Sliding Centre on Monday, January 22, 17-year-old daredevil Agnese Campeol won the silver medal in the women's monobob of the bobsleigh competition at the Winter YOG.



It was a major breakthrough, not only for Thailand but for the whole of southeast Asia, and Agnese herself couldn't quite believe it.

"I'm so confused, and so proud," she said.

"I was a little bit nervous at the start but I said to myself, I can do it'. This is big, so big. This is Thailand history - the first Winter YOG medal for Thailand. I want to keep going, I want to go to Milan-Cortina 2026. I will push 100 per cent no matter what. No matter the result."

Looking back on her start in the sport, she added: "I started with the Ski and Snowboard Association of Thailand. They wanted to look for athletes who wanted to go to the Winter Youth Olympic Games - and I wanted to go.

"At the start, I didn't know what bobsleigh was about at all. But I wanted to try. Bobsleigh is like The Hulk driving a Ferrari. I really like that. I have to fight with myself. It's me against myself."

Regarding the reaction of her friends and family to her taking part in bobsleigh, she said: "They think I'm crazy. At first, my parents didn't know what I was doing. But I wanted to do it, so they supported me."



PHENOMENAL

Nobody was prouder of her achievement than Nicola Minichiello, event delegate of the International Bobsleigh and Skeleton Federation.

"It's amazing," Nicola said. "Thailand have put a lot of effort and energy into getting involved in sliding sports and it's been incredible to see their evolution.

"It's phenomenal for Thailand, it's phenomenal for Asia, it's phenomenal for her as a person, also for the sport as a whole."

The British official said she was immediately impressed with the "positivity, attitude, dedication and work ethic" of the Thai athletes as soon as they joined the IBSF development programme two years ago, and that this silver medal proved that athletes from non-winter sports countries could excel with these qualities.



LEE AND KODAIRA INSPIRE NEW GENERATION OF SPEED SKATERS

f the young speed skaters at the Winter YOG needed any inspiration, two Winter Olympics icons provided this on the opening day of speed skating action at Gangneung Oval.

Korea's Lee Sang-hwa and Japan's Nao Kodaira produced one of the most memorable moments in Olympic Winter Games history at this very venue in 2018, when Nao ended Lee's hopes of a 500m hat trick in her final Olympic race.

Kodaira edged Lee to finish first in a Games record of 36.94 seconds, becoming the first Japanese female to win a speed skating gold.


Lee, on the other hand, was distraught and in tears, unable to come through. But there was Kodaira, draped in the Japanese flag, embracing and consoling her Korean friend who wept in her arms like a child.

Gangwon 2024 organisers and the IOC brought the pair together again for a reunion – and an opportunity for the media to project this feel-good Olympic story.

Lee said: "We have kept in touch since the PyeongChang Winter Olympics and we were on TV together in Japan when I visited her hometown Nagano. We have kept our friendship strong through

messaging and email. To return to the Gangneung Oval brings back a lot of memories and makes me feel very emotional."

Kodaira added: "When we were young athletes there was no Winter Youth Olympic Games, so this is a wonderful opportunity for everyone here to get experience and make new friends. We are telling them to enjoy this occasion and strive to compete in the Winter Olympics."



ISU PRESIDENT LOOKS FORWARD TO AWG HARBIN 2025

he President of the International Skating Union, Kim Jae Youl, was a proud man at the Winter YOG in his home country, Korea.

Not only was he impressed with Korea's hosting of the first Winter YOG in Asia, he was also delighted with the technical quality of the skaters both on the short track and inside the speed skating oval.

"I am extremely proud because the competitions are going really well," he said, after presenting the medals on the last day of speed skating.



The winter sports boom in Asia has seen PyeongChang host the 2018 Winter Olympics, Beijing the 2022 Winter Olympics and now Gangwon province the fourth Winter YOG, and first in

fourth Winter YOG, and first in Asia. The winter sports circuit moves to Harbin, China in February 2025 for the OCA's 9th Asian Winter Games.

"The young athletes are enjoying the venues, the competitions and the atmosphere, and the international guests are also appreciating the Winter Youth Olympic Games Gangwon 2024.

"The Youth Olympic Games is a unique platform where the young, the next generation of stars are competing at the global level.

The ISU President is already looking forward to it. "I am very excited that we are having the Asian Winter Games because the last one we had was 2017. I am very happy that China, Harbin, decided to host the Games, and we will have another one in 2029 in Saudi Arabia. There will be a great opportunity to develop skating in the Middle East," he said.

CHINA'S 'RABBIT TACTIC' EARNS GOLD AND SILVER – AND MILLIONS OF TIKTOK VIEWS

Chinese short trackers Yang Jingru and Li Jinzi raced to a remarkable gold-silver finish in the women's 1500 metres – the first short track final of the Winter YOG.

On the first lap of the 13 and a half lap-race, Yang burst out from the pack and, before anyone had time to react, she had raced around the track and caught up with the rest of the field.

When the bell rang to signal the last lap of the race for Yang, all the other skaters thought it applied to them, too – apart from Yang's Chinese teammate, Li.

As Yang cruised to victory on her final lap, Li moved into position to attack on the last lap for everyone else – and easily won the silver medal with the rest of the field in disarray.

After the race, the pair dubbed it the "rabbit tactic" – and it caused such a sensation that the TikTok video attracted over 22 million views.

According to Yang, the success of the tactic was down to two all-out sprints. "Normally in the 1500m race the athletes should speed up in the last few laps, but this time I have to sprint twice."



Li said she believed she got the silver medal because she executed the tactics well.

"After Yang won the race, my coach told me with hand signals that I still had one lap to go," said Li.

"When seeing the reaction of the other skaters, I also wondered if I had finished it, but my coach told me there was still one lap, so I continued to skate."

FIGURE SKATING CAPTURES ESSENCE OF OLYMPIC IDEALS

As always at a Winter Olympics, the figure skating packed in the crowds at the Gangneung Ice Area.


In East Asia, the rivalry is intense in the men's and women's singles between Japan and Korea – and this led to the highest attendances of the Winter YOG, with 12,000 spectators for the short programme and free skate on all four nights.

Not only is the graceful strength and athleticism of the skaters on display, so, too, is the impeccable behaviour of the spectators – women, men and children united as one in admiration of the athletes down in the pressure cooker on ice.

A skater falls, the crowd reacts with a collective "ahh", followed by a huge round of applause for encouragement. A skater performs a perfect jump, the crowd reacts with wild cheers, no matter which flag they represent. A skater, on completing their programme, reacts to the applause by bowing to all four sides of the arena as the gifts pour down from the stands.

It's heart-warming; it's moving and refreshing; it unites all nations, just as the Olympics should.

With the music and the colourful costumes, the relentless tension, the sheer joy and relief of nailing a jump that has been years in the making....figure skating is truly the king and queen of Olympic winter sports.



PATIENCE IS KEY TO CROSS-COUNTRY SUCCESS

inter Olympian Samaneh Beyrami Baher had plenty of advice for her three cross-country skiers from Iran at Gangwon 2024.

Parastoo Absalan and Melika Mirzaeidizaj competed in the women's competitions and Amir Mohammad Abolhassanzadeh Amghani in the men's races. All three were 16 years old, and all three were taking part in only their second competition overseas after a recent trip to Kazakhstan.

Samaneh, Iran's national youth coach, declared herself "totally satisfied" with their performances.

"They were sure in their technique, good in uphill and downhill and flat area, and they finished the race, so I am satisfied," she said.

As for the long journey ahead in this gruelling, energy-sapping sport, Samaneh added: "I want them to know that cross-country skiing is not like a speed sport.

"They have to train too much. They have to spend too much on training for their resistance and they have to train too much for their muscles, so it takes too much time to achieve their best performance. They need to be patient and try for their goals and not give up."



Samaneh, 32, has been involved with the national cross-country team for 13 years and was flagbearer for the Olympic Winter Games PyeongChang 2018. She also participated in five world championships and recorded a top-10 finish in qualification at Slovenia in 2021.

Despite moving into coaching, she has not given up her own career – and is aiming to qualify for her second Olympics in Italy in 2026.

QATARI CURLERS HAVE FUN ON WINTER YOG DEBUT

here was an unfamiliar curling country among the teams in the mixed doubles competition at Gangneung Curling Centre:


The Gulf state was represented by Aldana Al-Fahad, 15, and Mohammed Al-Naimi, 17, in the six-team round-robin Group B.

DOHA PROVIDES 'OUTSTANDING HOME' FOR AQUATICS ATHLETES

he World Aquatics Championships – Doha 2024 marked the first time that one of the world's biggest sports events had been held in the Middle East.

With only three venues hosting the six sports, Doha 2024 provided a compact and spectacular backdrop for this 21st edition of the world championships, which ran from February 2-18.

Artistic swimming, diving and open water swimming took centre

stage in the first week of the championships, while swimming and high diving took over the second week. Water polo ran throughout, building to a crescendo for the finals of the women's and men's competitions.

Speaking at the handover ceremony from Qatar 2024 to Singapore 2025 on the last night of swimming at Aspire Dome, World Aquatics President Husain Al-Musallam said he could not be prouder of Doha's achievement in hosting such a successful first world championships in the Middle East.

"This has been a truly exceptional World Aquatics Championships – Doha 2024. Doha has been an outstanding home for our athletes and our aquatics family. The venues are absolutely superb," he said.

"Our athletes have loved competing here, and I know they would want me to give a very big thank you to all the organisers under the leadership of H.E. Sheikh Joaan bin Hamad Al Thani for creating this magnificent aquatic palace," he added, referring to Aspire Dome.

"So much hard work is necessary to stage an event like this. I will always be grateful to every person here in Doha who has helped to turn all the plans into a reality. Qatar, thank you for showing the world once again that you are a remarkable destination for hosting major events."

Capt. Husain concluded that Doha 2024 had seen a new generation of aquatics stars emerge and described it as a "thrilling time" for the sport with the Paris Olympic Games just five months away.

CHINA WARMS UP FOR PARIS OLYMPICS WITH DOHA DOMINANCE

China's medal machine was in full production mode at the World Aquatics Championships – Doha 2024.

At the end of the 17-day, six-sports championships, China led the medal rankings on both counts – number of gold medals and total medals.

China left Doha with a healthy haul of 33 medals - 23 gold, eight silver and two bronze - in what was a very happy and prosperous start to the Lunar New Year of the Dragon.

The United States finished in second place with 9-6-8 (23), ahead of Australia on 7-12-5 (24), Netherlands 5-4-0 (9) and Great Britain 4-5-9 (18) to complete the top five.

Lower down the order, Korea came in eighth with 2-1-2 (5); Japan 17th with 1-1-2 (4); Hong Kong, China 20th on 1-1-1 (3); Kazakhstan 23rd with one gold medal; and DPR Korea in 25th place with two silver medals.



Thanks to their brilliant form in both diving and artistic swimming, China's place at the top of the overall rankings was virtually guaranteed before the eight days of swimming, worth 42 gold medals, had even started.

China won all nine of the diving events they entered, and added seven more gold in artistic swimming for a total of 16 heading into the swimming, in which they collected seven more. This was one swimming gold fewer than the United States, who won eight swimming gold and the women's water polo title.

For China, this was perfect preparation on the road to Paris 2024 – even in the absence of their leading swimmers: Hangzhou Asian Games MVPs Zhang Yufei and Qin Haiyang, who were focusing on their preparations for the Olympic Games.

WORLD RECORD PERFORMANCE WAS NO 'FLASH IN THE PAN'

n the absence of leading Chinese swimmers such as Hangzhou Asian Games MVPs Zhang Yufei and Qin Haiyang, could anyone pick up the baton and climb to the top of the podium?

Yes, they could – and his name was Pan Zhanle.

The 19-year-old Pan broke the world record of 46.86 seconds in the men's 100m freestyle by clocking 46.80 on the first leg of the men's 4x100m freestyle relay on the opening night of the swimming competition.



Pan and his team went on to claim gold, and the new world record-holder added three more gold medals to his tally during the course of the meet: 100m freestyle, men's 4x200m freestyle relay and mixed 4x100m freestyle relay.

"Actually, I wasn't feeling in great form," Pan said. "I would've been happy with just getting on the podium. I told myself, 'Just swim hard'. I was shocked when I saw the time. I wasn't expecting to break the record now - I wanted to leave it for the Paris 2024 Olympic Games."

After adding the men's individual 100m freestyle gold, Pan commented: "This is only the beginning. Let's meet again in Paris."

Pan had announced his arrival as a world-class freestyler at the Hangzhou Asian Games last September-October by winning three gold medals, three silvers and one bronze.

CHINESE TWIN SISTERS CELEBRATE GOLDEN GRAND SLAM

Chinese twins Wang Liuyi and Wang Qianyi completed a golden grand slam in artistic swimming at Doha 2024.

The 27-year-old sisters won four gold medals – women's duet technical, women's duet free, team acrobatic and team technical.

Wang Liuyi said: "I feel so excited and appreciate to have four gold medals. This is based on our hard training every day. Our team is a great team so they inspire us to show our best version."



She added that their mentality going into the finals – "a little bit of pressure and a little bit excited" – was the perfect condition to perform at the highest level.

Only two minutes separate the birth of the twins, and they admit they inspire each other every day in training and in their daily lives. "It is heart-warming when we get a great performance," said Liuyi.

ADVENTURE IS A WAY OF LIFE FOR INDIAN TEEN RITHIKA



At the age of 16, India's Rithika Bangalore Mahesh has already competed in two World Aquatics Championships in women's open water swimming.

And she plans to attend many more as she prepares for her future after completing her education.

"I am still at school. I am in the 12th grade right now," she said, after the women's 5km open water race at Old Doha Port. "I

wish to continue swimming. I am thinking about becoming professional," she adds.

Until then, Rithika will continue to make inroads into the 5km race, and feels she made progress in Doha compared to her world championships debut in Fukuoka, Japan last July.

"I have been training in open water swimming for the past two or three years now, so this is my second world championships. In Fukuoka my time was 1 hour and 12 minutes and here it was 1 hour 8 minutes; I have improved on the time so I guess I am happy with that. I am going to train better."

Living in Bangalore, Rithika swims in the pool and also in the "back waters – the dam waters basically," she says.

"Open water swimming is far more adventurous. I like the sport," she adds.

Rithika admits that her goal is to improve her time in every race. "My aim is to go ahead of yourself, push yourself," she says.

Looking back on her Doha experience, Rithika said: "The staff are quite supportive here and they are quite caring, too. The venue is amazing – it's clean, nice. I like it."

SINGAPORE 'EXCITED' BY WOMEN'S WATER POLO DEBUT

aking their first appearance in the women's water polo competition of the World Aquatics Championships, Singapore found out exactly how tough it was at the top.

They finished 16th out of 16 teams and suffered some heavy defeats along the way, but still they remained optimistic and excited about the future, especially with the next world championships in Singapore in 2025.

Ranice Yap Jingxuan, 17, said the players were far from downhearted.

"Generally, we are still quite excited to be playing in this competition because it is all like a learning opportunity and everything is new to us," she said. Singapore discuss tactics in their match against Hungary.

"It is the first time for us to play on the world stage and it is an eye-opening experience for us; it's exciting to play every game and exciting to learn new things from the other teams."

Looking ahead to next year in Singapore, Ranice added: "I think

we would like to show how much we have improved throughout the years and also put up a fight. We want to show our fighting spirit in the pool, and also once again gain experience from other teams.

ASIA'S ONLY HIGH DIVER IN DOHA - 'I FEEL ALIVE RIGHT NOW'

Standing alone at the top of the high diving tower, 27 metres above an entry pool of just 15 metres in diameter, Korea's Choi Byunghwa feels very much alone.

This is pretty much how he feels most of the time in his life as a high diver – alone.

Choi, 32, was Asia's only representative in the high diving competition, men and women, and struggles for funding back home in Korea with high diving not an Olympic Games sport.



When asked how he felt to be Asia's lone high diver in Doha, Choi replied: "It's a really great, great honour for me.

"Actually, you know I am the only one - Asian high diver - and I am really proud of that kind of meaning. I don't have the acrobatic base; I am not a former professional diver or gymnast; I just started this sport at age 24. I came a really long way, really tough way."

Choi accepts that high diving is not a priority for the Korean Swimming Federation, as they have many top athletes in Olympic sports such as swimming, artistic swimming and diving – or "indoor diving" as he refers to it.

He adds: "I am the only athlete, high diver, in South Korea. Also, there is no coach in my country, so I am here alone by myself everywhere – every training, every competition...everything I do by myself."

But this does not concern him when he stands on the 27m podium – the equivalent of jumping from the eighth storey of a high-rise building into an entry pool that resembles a bowl of soup from such a great height.

'I love my life'

"I don't think too much about the ranking of the game, it does not matter for me. It's a really great honour to participate in this competition with the world's greatest high divers. It's a really great honour for me - I really love my life."

Asked why high diving was not popular in other Asian countries, he replied: "Actually I am not sure about other countries like Japan or China, I don't know about that, but in my country we have many great 10-metre divers but they don't want to do higher.

"Many times, I ask them but they said 'hey, crazy, hey Choi, I don't want to die!' People think like that. People in my county, they don't want to take some risk. Everybody thinks crazy things about this sport, that it's too dangerous, so it's really hard for me in one of the Asian countries, South Korea...doing high diving is a really tough way."

The rewards are worth it, though, as he plummets into the pool - and fulfills something deep inside.

"I want to live my life how I want, how I really want," he adds. "I cannot earn much money for this but I feel alive right now."

To fund his passion for high diving, Choi teaches swimming, life-saving and first aid in Seoul, but is seeking sponsors from the corporate world so that he can train in countries like the United States, Austria and Canada and compete on a regular basis on the world circuit.

Reflecting on his Doha experience, in which he finished 23rd of 27 competitors, and his second world championships after Fukuoka 2023, Choi said: "I am super happy with my performance. I know I need more training and experience, but for now I am really happy to finish my competition with safety and with good dives. So, I am really satisfied and really huge happy, I feel."

Choi feels he can carry on for five or six more years, even up until he reaches 40 years old, as his life in general has benefited from the discipline of high diving and training.

"I eat clean food only and I sleep well – I take care of everything about my condition," he said.



ALL EYES ON SINGAPORE FOR NEXT WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

orld Aquatics President Husain Al-Musallam has expressed excitement about Singapore hosting the next World Aquatics Championships.

"We have made history here in Doha, just as we will in Singapore in 2025 - the first time the World Aquatics Championships will take place in Southeast Asia," he said.

"Singapore has everything we hope to share with our athletes: world-class

facilities, proven experience of hosting events of the highest quality and a passion for aquatic sports that runs from an elite to community level."

Mark Chay, Co-Chair of the World Aquatics Championships - Singapore 2025 Organising Committee, noted the impact the event will have in Southeast Asia.

"In just 18 months, the world's attention will turn to Southeast Asia as Singapore takes the stage to proudly host the 2025 edition of the World Aquatics Championships and World Aquatics Masters Championships," he said.

"Singapore eagerly anticipates welcoming the world's most elite athletes and masters aquatics athletes. Their performances are certain to ignite inspiration in future generations across Singapore, the region, and beyond."

Competition venues in Singapore will include the Singapore Sports Hub, a world-class complex that includes the National Stadium, Singapore Indoor Stadium and OCBC Aquatic Centre which features two 50m pools and a diving facility.



BEIJING AWARDED 2029 WORLD AQUATICS CHAMPIONSHIPS

Beijing was announced as the host of the 2029 World Aquatics Championships on the sidelines of Doha 2024.

The showcase World Aquatics event will be organised in close cooperation with the China Swimming Association and the Beijing Municipal Bureau of Sports.

World Aquatics President Husain Al-Musallam commented: "Beijing has repeatedly welcomed major aquatics events, providing excellent conditions that enable our athletes to perform at their very best.

"Thanks to our longstanding collaboration with our friends in China, we know the global aquatics community can look forward to world-class sporting action and entertainment in one of the world's most iconic cities."

Beijing in particular and China in general has a long history of hosting top-class international aquatics events.

"The People's Republic of China is deeply passionate about aquatic sports. We have a very proud history of

welcoming the best aquatics athletes to our country," said China Swimming Association President Zhou Jihong.

Following Doha 2024, the 2025 and 2027 editions of the World Aquatics Championships will be hosted in Singapore and Budapest, respectively.

OCA SETS DATE FOR GENERAL ASSEMBLY

he Olympic Council of Asia announced on March 8 that the 43rd OCA Ordinary General Assembly will be held in Bangkok, Thailand on Saturday, May 11.

The GA was originally scheduled to take place in New Delhi, India on April 14 but was moved due to the festival of Eid and also the forthcoming general elections in India.

"This would have caused severe difficulties to several NOCs and to OCA if the General Assembly were to be held in New Delhi as originally planned," the OCA said.

The GA was moved to Bangkok to make sure all NOCs could attend.

The agenda includes progress reports from the organising committees of four upcoming games – AIMAG 6 in Thailand this November, Harbin Asian Winter Games in February 2025, Tashkent Asian Youth Games 2025 and Aichi-Nagoya Asian Games 2026 – as well as a report from the Chair of the OCA Constitutional Reforms Committee.

IOC President Thomas Bach is scheduled to attend and give an address to the GA.

OCA CULTURE COMMITTEE

he Chair of the OCA Culture Committee, Khunying Patama Leeswadtrakul, highlighted the close relationship between sport and culture during an online meeting of the committee on Wednesday, March 6.



The IOC Member from Thailand provided details of all the art and cultural events attached to the OCA's Asian Games in Hangzhou, China last September and October and the recent Winter Youth Olympic Games Gangwon 2024.

"Since our last meeting on July 1, 2023, there have been so many important events organised with a combination of sport and culture which may give us inspiration for the future," said Khunying Patama.

Committee member Francis Wanandi of Indonesia reviewed the One Asia 110-years celebration held in Hangzhou last September 24 and said the One Asia brand was expanding its activities with an event running alongside AIMAG 6 in Thailand this November.

MALAYSIA, BAHRAIN TO HOST OS/OCA REGIONAL FORUMS

The popular and informative regional forums for the OCA's 45 National Olympic Committees have been confirmed for 2024.

Lumpur, Malaysia on Friday and Saturday, May 3-4, and the forum for West, Central and South Asian NOCs will be held in Manama, Bahrain on Monday and Tuesday, May 6-7.





The two-day forum for South East Asian and East Asian NOCs will take place in Kuala NOCs are allowed to register two delegates, including the Chef de Mission of the 6th AIMAG and the Secretary General/staff member responsible for IOC/OCA activities (Paris 2024/AIMAG or Harbin Asian Winter Games).



OCA's IT audit team spent a busy few days working with the organising committees of three upcoming games. OCA'S AIMAG MEETINGS IN BANGKOK 'VERY FRUITFUL'

he Deputy Director General of the Olympic Council of Asia, Vinod Kumar Tiwari, described a series of meetings with Thai organisers of the 6th Asian Indoor and Martial Arts Games as "very fruitful".

After a delay of three years from the original hosting period in 2021, AIMAG 6 will now be taking place in Bangkok and Chonburi province from November 21-30, 2024.



In order to prepare for the Games, the OCA organised three meetings in early March for the key participants to set the ball rolling on the road to AIMAG 6.

The first Technical Delegates Meeting took place from March 2-3, the first Chefs de Mission Meeting on March 4-5 and finally the fourth OCA Coordination Committee meeting from March 6-7.

In addition, a 260-day countdown ceremony was held at the Centara Grand Hotel in Bangkok on March 5 with the presence of OCA Director General Husain Al-Musallam.

Summing up the technical delegates and chefs de mission meetings, Mr. Tiwari said: "Those two meetings have been very, very fruitful for us. We had the site visits and meetings and we are pleasantly very surprised that the preparations are going on quite well. This time in November we will have a very, very successful Asian Games.

"Regarding the preparations, though the venues are still dry, but we hope that by the time we come back in November everything will be in place and we will have a very, very successful Asian Games."

There will be a total of 36 sports, with 20 in Bangkok and 16 in Chonburi province, some two hours' drive from the capital and well known for the tourist hot spot of Pattaya, along with two demonstration sports.

The exact number of events is still being discussed between the two sides, although the provisional figure is 357.

OCA DIRECTOR GENERAL PRAISES SPECIAL TIES WITH THAIS IN GAMES HOSTING

hailand's close ties with the Olympic Council of Asia were highlighted by OCA Director General Husain Al-Musallam during the 260 days countdown ceremony on March 5.

Thailand has hosted the Asian Games four times, in 1966, 1970, 1978 and 1998, the first Asian Indoor Games in 2005 and the first Asian Martial Arts Games in 2009, as well as the Asian Beach Games in Phuket in 2016. AIMAG 6 this November will continue that journey.

"We are deeply appreciative of what Thailand has done for Asia. You are always ready to welcome our OCA Games to your beautiful country," he said.

"It is our duty at the OCA, hand-in-hand with the Thai government, the Thai people and the Thai NOC, to make the Asian Indoor and Martial Arts Games a success. We are ever grateful to this country and we want to make sure this event is organised in the best possible fashion," Mr. Al-Musallam added.

Referring to the three-year delay, Mr Al-Musallam said: "Covid impacted everything. But I know that the Thai organising committee is doing its very best to host these Games in the best manner they can."

He pointed out that hosting the Asian Games four times previously had helped play a role in Thailand developing its tourism industry and other sectors, and hoped AIMAG 6 could also be similarly seen as a jump-start for the Thai economy.

Mr. Al-Musallam added: "The benefits of sports are many and, by hosting this event, let's hope everyone sees that. There is nothing more important in life than health and a healthy society. And the best way to achieve these goals is through sport."

OCA VP OUTLINES 'SIGNIFICANT PROGRESS' AT TD MEETING

he OCA Vice President for AlMAG 6, Dato' Seri Chaiyapak Siriwat, informed the technical delegates that "significant progress" had been made on the road to Bangkok and Chonburi.

Dato' Seri Chaiyapak was addressing delegates at the first Technical Delegates Meeting on March 2 at the Centara Grand Hotel in Bangkok and set the scene for the 36-sport AIMAG in November

"We have made significant progress in preparations in all areas including all technical aspects like competition venues, training facilities, equipment and other amenities," he said.

"Everything will be in place before the Games get underway in November."

Thailand's Minister of Tourism and Sports, Ms. Sudawan Wangsuphakijkosol, sent a video message to the TD meeting and said AIMAG 6 would showcase Thailand's readiness to host major international sports events in the future.

"It is a great honour and pride to host this major international



event," said Sudawan, who is also the Chair of the AIMAG 6 organising committee, TAIMAGOC.

"On behalf of the Government, we will showcase our readiness to host this major event which will portray Thailand as an international sports hub," she added.

AIMAG INCLUSION PROVIDES BOOST FOR TENPIN BOWLING

AIMAG 6 will be a massive boost for the sport of tenpin bowling in Asia, said Danny Santos, a senior official of the International Bowling Federation and Asian Bowling Federation.

The Technical Delegate for bowling said AIMAG 6 would come at a good time for his sport, especially after it missed out on the Hangzhou Asian Games last year and is not on the programme for Aich-Nagoya 2026.

"The Bangkok event will serve to keep our sport in the limelight especially when it comes to funding for national federations across Asia," Santos explained.

Bowling has to depend on government funding in Asia, according to Santos, so missing out on Hangzhou 2022 and Aichi-Nagoya 2026 has been a big blow.

"AIMAG 6 will go some way towards alleviating this pain," added the Filipino, who is based in Kuwait with the Asian



Bowling Federation.

"Luckily, in Southeast Asia, next year will see the SEA Games take place in Bangkok where bowling has been included. Taking part in international multi-sports events like these help national federations in funding," Santos said.

CC MEETING RECOMMENDS SPORTS PROGRAMME CHANGES



he 4th OCA Coordination Committee meeting brought the curtain down on the six days of meetings involving Technical Delegates and Chefs de Mission.

Under the chairmanship of OCA Vice President Timothy Fok, the OCA and AIMAG organisers discussed all key aspects of the Games.



Among the decisions taken were:

- Streamlining the sports programme, especially limiting team sports to 12 teams per competition, with the exception of futsal with 16 teams.
- To cut down on the number of events per sport, as 359 in 36 sports was deemed too large, especially in two hosting cities a long way apart.
 - To cut down on the number of technical officials.
- Water polo, with two events, to be dropped from the aquatics programme.

Organisers will keep the number of sports at 36, plus two demonstration sports, making this the biggest AIMAG in OCA history going back to 2013, but the measures taken at the CC meeting were an attempt to cut down on costs.

Thai organisers, who looked at various issues like venues, transport, volunteers and medical and anti-doping, also revealed that the accreditation card issued for athletes and officials could not be used as an entry visa, and that all participants would need to apply for a Thai visa separately if required.


"Women, with their determination, confidence, capabilities and potential, are a force to be reckoned with within their communities," Sheikha Hayat said.


"Arming themselves with knowledge, keeping up with developments in various fields, especially in sports, with passion and enthusiasm will ensure sustainability and continued development for future generations.

FEI SOLIDARITY GRANT FUELS EQUINE CAREERS IN CAMBODIA

he Cambodian Equestrian Federation (CEF) has launched a pioneering training programme aimed at boosting the participation of young women in Cambodia's growing equestrian sector, reports the International Equestrian Federation (FEI).

Created with the support of a Gender Equality Grant from FEI Solidarity, the primary objective of the programme is to provide comprehensive support and mentorship to women aged 15 to 20, guiding them towards establishing sustainable careers as grooms in stables or riding centres.

The programme will offer basic training as well as specialised courses to equip the participants with advanced skills in horse care and facility maintenance.

The training programme – which will take place at the Genius Resort, the new CEF training centre situated in Phnom Penh – has been officially endorsed by the FEI President and Chair of the FEI Solidarity Committee, Ingmar De Vos, and by FEI Vice President and Group VIII Chair Jack Huang.

A total of 20 women, in two groups of 10, will join the programme. Once they have graduated, the apprentices will be accompanied by the CEF in their job search.

HRH Nanda-Dévi Norodom, CEF Secretary General and the architect of the training programme, said: "We are honoured to be the recipients of this Gender Equality Grant. The financial support from FEI Solidarity will go a long way to improving the know-how required for equestrian activities to grow and thrive in our country, while giving these young women the opportunity to make significant economic contributions to society.

"In Cambodia, the equine sector has a shortage of skilled and qualified professionals which makes it impossible to address the increasing demand and needs of the different stakeholders in the equestrian sector.

"While this programme blends practical and theoretical learning, participants will also be taught basic English vocabulary relating to horses, grooming and riding. Our aim is to ensure that these young women leave the programme well prepared for the workforce and can avail of any and all opportunities for employment."

The project has garnered enthusiastic backing, notably from Cambodia's Queen Mother Norodom Monineath Sihanouk - a passionate advocate for women's empowerment.

CHEN NAMED DIVING ATHLETE OF THE YEAR

China's Chen Yiwen has been named female diving athlete of the year for 2023 by World Aquatics.

The 24-year-old 3m springboard ace dominated her discipline throughout the year and collected a prize of USD 10,000.

Chen was honoured for winning just about everything in women's 3m springboard in 2023, including the Xi'an World Cup in April with a personal record 404.70 points and the Montreal World Cup in May.

In July, she successfully defended her 2022 world title in Fukuoka and went on to win the Berlin Super Final in August and the Asian Games in Hangzhou, China, in October.

"This award made my day," Chen said. "Last year was not the best year of my life, definitely not. Last year's world championships were not as good as I wanted, but it gave me a lot of experience, like how to change my mindset going into the competition."

As for the prize money, Chen said, "It is Chinese New Year so I need to support my family. I will spend it on my family."

Australia's 10m platform world champion in Fukuoka, Cassiel Rousseau, was named male diving athlete of the year.



KISHMALA EARNS PAKISTAN SHOOTING SPOT AT PARIS 2024

Pistol shooter Kishmala Talat has become the first female shooter from Pakistan to qualify for the Olympic Games.

Kishmala, 21, won the silver medal in the women's 10m air pistol at the Asian Shooting Championships in Jakarta in January to earn direct qualification for Paris.

The Olympic Solidarity scholarship athlete has shown great potential in her shooting career.



She won a silver medal in the South Asian Games in Nepal in 2019 and a bronze medal in the women's 10m air pistol at the Hangzhou Asian Games last year.

"With Kishmala's great performance, Pakistan is geared up to compete in five shooting events in Paris 2024," the Pakistan Olympic Association said in a statement.

"Let's cheer for our star. Congratulations, Kishmala Talat, on your remarkable feat."

ABE CROWNED JUDOKA OF THE YEAR

okyo Olympic champion Uta Abe, 23, was named International Judo Federation female judoka of the year for 2023 - the second year running after continuing her dominance of the women's 52-kilogram division.

Abe, who has not lost in IJF competition since 2019, went back-to-back as both world

champion and Tokyo Grand Slam winner last year. Her world title victory in Doha in May was the fourth of her career.

"I'm very happy. I want to fight with all my might at the 2024 Paris Olympics," Uta said in a video message played at the award ceremony in Paris.



OCA MEDIA COMMITTEE CHAIR CHARLES LO PASSES AWAY, 79

he OCA was in deep mourning after the much-loved Charles Lo, Chair of the OCA Media Committee, passed away on October 7 at the age of 79.

Mr. Lo, who was born in 1944 into a prominent family in Macau, served three terms as OCA Media Committee Chair from 2011 to 2023.

He was President of the Sports and Olympic Committee of Macau, China, the Golf Association of Macau and the Automobile General Association Macau-China, overseeing the annual Macau Grand Prix.

"On behalf of the Olympic sports movement in Asia, the OCA is deeply saddened to learn of the passing of our dear friend and colleague, Mr. Charles Lo," the OCA said in a statement.

"He was always one of the most popular members of the OCA Executive Board and we will miss his friendship and his bright, positive outlook on life. He is a great loss to the OCA and to the Olympic sports movement in general."

For his commitment and dedication to the development of sport in Macau, Mr. Lo was awarded the Medal of Merit for Sports by the Macau Special Administrative Region Government in 2012.



DATO' KRISHNASAMY THAMBUSAMY

he Olympic Council of Malaysia reported that two-time Olympic sprinter Dato' Krishnasamy Thambusamy passed away peacefully on December 20, 2023, at the age of 79.

Dato' Krishnasamy Thambusamy, who was well known as "Thambu Krishnan" within the athletics fraternity, was a renowned sprinter in the 1960s and 1970s.

He represented Malaysia at the 1968 and 1972 Olympic Games, the Asian Games in 1966 and 1970 and four South East Asian Peninsular Games. (OCM)


LISA RUMBEWAS, INDONESIAN WEIGHTLIFTER

Indonesia NOC announced that three-time Olympic medallist Lisa Raema Rumbewas died on January 14 at the age of 43.

Born in 1980, Rumbewas competed at three editions of the Olympic Games, starting at Sydney 2000 where she won a silver medal in the flyweight (-48kg) category.

In 2002, she obtained an Olympic Solidarity scholarship to prepare for the Athens Games in 2004, where she won silver in the featherweight (-53kg) category.

At her last Olympic appearance in Beijing in 2008, she was awarded the bronze medal, again in the featherweight (-53kg) category.



AJIT SINGH, SINGAPORE HOCKEY

Ajit represented Singapore at the Melbourne 1956 Olympic Games as part of the first and only hockey team to represent the Republic at the Games.

Grace Fu, President of the SNOC, paid tribute to the versatile athlete: "I am saddened by the passing of Mr Ajit Singh and would like to extend my heartfelt condolences to his wife Surjit and his family.

"Ajit was the quintessential sportsman of his time - he was a golfer into his 90s, played cricket, represented Singapore in hockey at the 1956 Olympic Games and competed in masters athletics races.

"He remained active in Singapore sports after his competitive sporting career and participated in many activities. He will be greatly missed."



MOHAMMAD TAVAKOL, IRAN WRESTLING

Dr. Mohammad Tavakol, a former member of the United World Wrestling Bureau and Hall of Famer, passed away in Tehran at the age of 89 after a period of illness.

Born in 1923 in Qazvin, Iran, Tavakol chaired the Iranian Wrestling Federation and was Vice President of the UWW. He served four six-year terms as a member of the Executive Committee of the UWW and was elected head of UWW Asia for a four-year term.

He was chairman of the Medical Commission of UWW and was inducted into the UWW Hall of Fame in 2011.

Iran NOC, deeply saddened by the death of Dr. Mohammad Tavakol, expressed its condolences to his respected family and the country's sports community, especially the proud sport of wrestling.



Beijing to host 2027 world athletics championships

The World Athletics Council has selected Beijing to host the 2027 World Athletics Championships, 12 years on from the Chinese capital's successful staging of the world championships in 2015. The 2025 world championships will be in Tokyo. China will also host next year's World Athletics Indoor Championships, in Nanjing.

The 12-team field for the Women's Olympic Basketball Tournament Paris 2024 from July 29 to August 11 is now complete following the conclusion of the four FIBA Women's Olympic Qualifying Tournaments in Antwerp, Belgium; Belem, Brazil; Xi'an, China and Sopron, Hungary.

The 12 teams are: Australia, Belgium, Canada, China, France, Germany, Japan, Nigeria, Puerto Rico, Serbia, Spain, USA.

O Mai Yamamoto (Japan) was one of four players to receive the TISSOT MVP award.

The draw was made for the men's and women's water polo competitions at the Paris Olympic Games from August 5-11 on the sidelines of the World Aquatics Championships – Doha 2024 on Saturday, February 17.

Men (12 teams):

Hungary, Greece, Croatia, Spain, United States, Australia, Japan, Romania, Serbia, Italy, Montenegro, France. Japan have been drawn into Group B with Australia, Serbia, France, Hungary and Spain.

Women (10 teams):

Netherlands, Spain, Greece, Australia, Hungary, Italy, United States, China, Canada, France. China have been drawn in Group A with Hungary, Australia, Canada and the Netherlands. (World Aquatics)

Indian tennis player elected to tour panel

The International Tennis Federation has revealed the 12 players elected to serve on the ITF World Tennis Tour Player Panels for the next two years until the end of the 2025 season.

Parth Aggarwal (India) has been elected as a member of the five-strong men's player panel.

The results follow the third election since the Player Panels were established in 2020, with seven members elected to the women's panel, and five elected to the men's.

Riyadh to host 2024 UIPM Congress

The Executive Board of the UIPM – Modern Pentathlon has agreed unanimously to award the 73rd UIPM Congress to Riyadh, Saudi Arabia.

The elective Congress will take place on November 16-17, 2024 as the capital of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia hosts UIPM's global decision-making summit for the first time.

The UIPM 2024 Congress was originally awarded to Antigua (GUA) but the award was withdrawn in March 2023 after the suspension of the Guatemala Olympic Committee by the IOC.

Shanghai selected for OQS

Shanghai and Budapest have been selected as hosts for the Olympic Qualifier Series - a new series of festival-style events combining sport with urban culture.

The two-part series, taking place in the period leading up to the Olympic Games Paris 2024, will be an important step in determining which athletes qualify in BMX freestyle, breaking, skateboarding and sport climbing for Paris 2024.

The Shanghai stop on the Series will be held at the Huangpu Riverside from May 16-19, while the Budapest event will take place at the Ludovika Campus from June 20-23. (IOC)

IOC President honours table tennis Olympians

IOC President Thomas Bach presented a diploma and OLY pin to table tennis Olympians Feng Tianwei (Singapore) and Sharath Kamal Achanta (India) at Olympic House.

Currently an IOC Athletes' Department intern, four-time Olympian Feng won one silver medal at Beijing 2008 and two bronze medals at London 2012.



An International Table Tennis Federation (ITTF) Athletes' Commission Co-Chair, Kamal competed in four Olympic Games - Athens 2004, Beijing 2008, Rio 2016 and Tokyo 2020.

Five sports accepted for LA 2028

Baseball/softball, cricket (T20), flag football, lacrosse (sixes) and squash have been officially included as additional sports on the programme for the Olympic Games Los Angeles 2028. The decision was taken at the 141st IOC Session in Mumbai, India last October.

The five sports were proposed by the LA28 Organising

Committee as a package for their edition of the Games only, and were reviewed and supported by the IOC's Olympic Programme Commission and Executive Board.

For baseball and softball, cricket and lacrosse it will be a return to the Olympic Games, while flag football and squash will be making their Olympic debut in LA. (IOC) - 2024
